Peter Clark



Splitting his time between New York City and Australia, violinist Peter Clark is widely celebrated for the unique breadth and scope of his leadership across the arts sector.

As concertmaster, Peter has appeared with New Zealand Opera, Queensland Symphony Orchestra, Sydney Chamber Opera, Victoria Opera, Royal New Zealand Ballet, Darwin Symphony, and Orchestra Wellington. He has also appeared as Guest Principal Second of the RTÉ Concert Orchestra, Dublin, and has toured with the Australian World Orchestra.



Peter's commitment to arts access has led him to perform in more than 130 regional towns and cities across Australia, as well as to develop a beloved music program at Melbourne's Royal Children's Hospital, through his extensive work with the Australian Chamber Orchestra.

In the field of public speaking and advocacy, Peter has developed a reputation as one of Australia's most sought-after speakers, presenting for orchestras around the world. His audiences range from young school students, through to Australian Prime Ministers, as he communicates and passionately advocates for the central role of music in society. His recent work includes delivering the late Richard Gill's 2023 Voyage of Musical Discovery series.

Peter's doctoral research on social innovation and cohesion through music is generously supported by Judith Neilson AM, and the General Sir John Monash Foundation. He is also completing an MBA in Arts Innovation, with the generous support of the American Australian Association.

Peter first played in Carnegie Hall with the Australian Chamber Orchestra at the age of twenty. He plays a fine 1936 AE Smith violin, and is Principal Violin of Omega Ensemble.

Zoe Freisberg



Zoe commenced her violin studies under the direction of her mother, Helena Freisberg. She completed her Bachelor of Music at Queensland Conservatorium with Michele Walsh where she was awarded the Matilda Jane Aplin Prize and the Varda Jefferies Prize. During her studies in Queensland, Zoe played as a soloist with Redlands Symphony Orchestra, Corda Spiritus Orchestra and the Brisbane Philharmonic Orchestra. In 2014, Zoe commenced studies at the Australian National Academy of Music under the tutelage of Robin Wilson. The same year, Zoe joined the Australian Chamber Orchestra's ACO2 on four tours as an Emerging Artist under the mentorship of Principal ACO Violinist, Helena Rathbone. Zoe was also one of six finalists in the 2014 ABC Young Performers Award as well as a finalist in the ANAM Concerto Competition. Zoe is very honoured to be the recipient of the Australian Youth Orchestra's Richard Pollett Memorial Award. In 2015, Zoe won the Australian Youth Classical Music

Competition's Overseas Travel Scholarship and was a finalist in the ABC Young Performers Award.

Alexander McFarlane



New Zealand violist Alexander McFarlane is Associate Principal Viola with the New Zealand Symphony Orchestra, with which he has also performed as a soloist. Equally at home in a solo, chamber, or orchestral idiom, he has performed internationally in venues including the Wigmore Hall, the Barbican Hall, the Musikverein in Vienna and the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam. As a chamber musician, he has collaborated with such artists as Janine Jansen, Anthony Marwood, and the Doric String Quartet, and performed at festivals including Yellow Barn, "At the World's Edge" Festival, the "Mendelssohn on Mull"

Festival, and "Musique à Marsac" in France. Competition success includes winning the 2018 Lorna Viol Memorial Prize and ROSL Trophy for the most Outstanding Musician from Overseas at the ROSL Annual Music Competition,



and in 2017 the First Prize and the Bach Prize at the Gisborne International Music Competition. Alex received his Master's degree and Artist Diploma under the tutelage of Professor David Takeno at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, and has also played in masterclasses to artists including Tabea Zimmermann, Kim Kashkashian, and Lars Anders Tomter. In addition to playing with the NZSO, Alex has performed with the London Symphony Orchestra, the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, the Scottish Chamber Orchestra, and the Australian Chamber Orchestra.

Paul Stender



Since returning to Australia in 2009, Paul has established a diverse performing career, working regularly with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra and Australian Chamber Orchestra as well as guest principal cello engagements with Opera Australia Orchestra, Sydney Philharmonia and ACO Collective. A keen chamber musician, Paul has appeared with numerous smaller ensembles including Australia Ensemble and Sydney Art Quartet. Paul is currently principal cellist with Omega Ensemble with which he maintains a busy performing, touring and recording schedule. Paul completed his Bachelor of Music with David Pereira at the Canberra School of Music before moving to Austria to continue his studies with Vienna Philharmonic principal Wolfgang Herzer at the Universität für Musik und Darstellende Kunst Wien.

Will Hansen



Will Hansen (BMus., Performance) is a Sydney-based double bassist, composer and teacher. His works extends across many disciplines; from Historical performance to Contemporary Classical, and Orchestral to Musical Theatre. Will has worked with a variety of groups and ensembles, including Omega Ensemble, Ensemble Offspring, Living Room Theatre, the Brett Whiteley Gallery, Legs on the Wall, Willoughby Symphony Orchestra, Sydney Philharmonia Choirs and Victorian Opera. Will was selected as a finalist in the 2021 Freedman Classical Fellowship, and was Ensemble Offspring's 2020-21 Hatched Academy Associate Artist. Will plays on "Kashtan", a specially commissioned double bass built from 2021-22 from Australian woods by Sydney luthier Matthew Tucker.

Notable performances and appearances include: Double bass and bass guitarist of "Mary Poppins" at the Sydney Lyric Theatre 2022, Ensemble Offspring's "Mesmerism" at Sydney Opera House, multiple national tours with Omega Ensemble, Sydney Conservatorium tours to both China and Spain, and the 2023 ABC Australia Day Concert with John Foreman's Australian Pops Orchestra live from the Sydney Opera House Forecourt. He was also recently interviewed about his double bass "Kashtan" on ABC Classic for their 2023 classic 100 countdown.

Will is the head of strings at Mowbray Public school, and conducts several other groups including Middle Harbour Public School and The Symphony for Life Foundation. Will also teaches double bass at Barker College, The King's School, and Sydney Girls High School.


VENUES
